Terry Wayne Cornish, lovingly known as “Corn” and “Cornbread,” was born on August 9, 1966, in Memphis, Texas, to Peggy Jean Cornish and Kenneth Wayne Cornish. Shortly after his birth, the family moved to Colorado, where he was raised and built lifelong connections. He passed away on Monday, April 6, 2026, surrounded by family and friends after a brief battle with leukemia.

Terry attended Montbello Jr. Sr. High School from 1980 to 1984, where he made a lasting impression both academically and athletically. He was an All-American football player and was well known and well liked by many. His natural talent extended beyond the field he was an incredible artist and was responsible for designing the original school mascot before the school opened. After high school, he attended college in Nebraska and Northern California, where he continued playing football. He once aspired to become a civil engineer, a path that reflected both his intelligence and his gift for drawing and design.

Terry had a deep love for sports and was a die-hard Kansas City Chiefs fan. He enjoyed life in a way that brought laughter and connection to those around him. Known for his humor, he loved playing dominoes and would always talk a little “smack” when he won. He was strong, protective of his loved ones, and deeply respected by many. Wherever people saw either of his sisters, they would often first ask about Terry before anything else, then follow with, “How are you doing?” Many would take that moment to share memories of him; a true reflection of the lasting impression he made on those who knew him.



Terry also had a passion for dog handling, which became a meaningful part of his life. He took great pride in working with dogs, especially Rottweilers, and was dedicated to training and building strong connections with them. There truly wasn't a dog he couldn't work with, and dogs of all breeds seemed to naturally trust and love him. He shared his knowledge with others, including through podcasts where he spoke about different breeds and training techniques. His calm presence and natural ability earned him respect within the dog-handling community, and it remained a source of joy and purpose throughout his life.

Terry was a licensed electrician and took great pride in his work, especially building custom homes. The bigger and more complex the project, the more excited he was to take it on. He enjoyed learning and sharing what he knew with others, leaving a lasting impression on those who crossed his path.

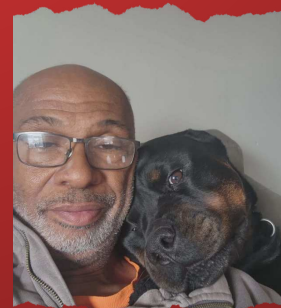
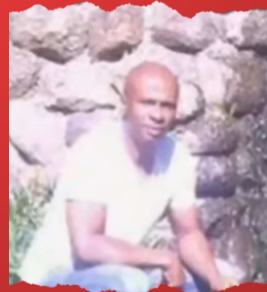
Terry gave his life to the Lord in middle school and continued to study the Word throughout his life, seeking understanding and sharing it with others.
