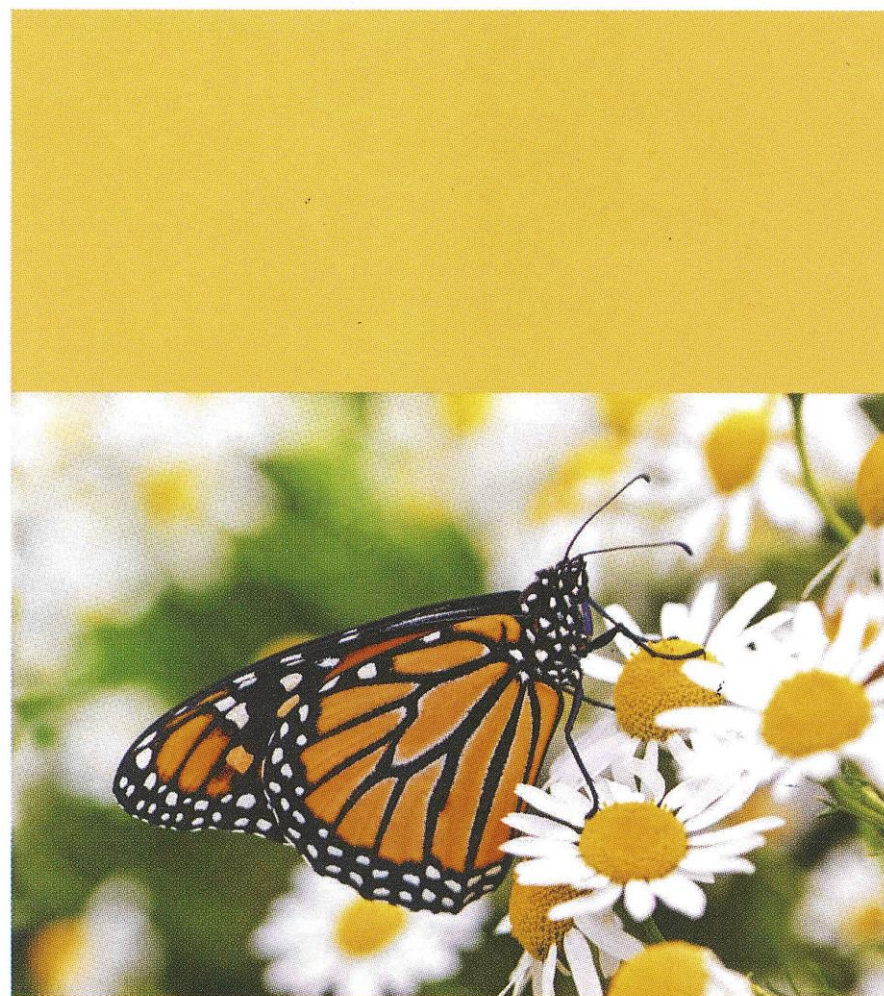
After the grocery store, Jane went on to work numerous jobs in Chamberlain and Oacoma, foremost for many decades with the Brule County Sheriff's office.
