Curtis Bartell Grover, aged 89, peacefully passed away on July 25, 2026, in Tremonton, Utah. Born on October 7, 1936, in East Garland to Orval L. Grover and Pearl Eva Petersen, Curtis lived a full and impactful life.

He married his beloved Bonnie Sue Grover on April 4, 1959, in Tremonton, Utah, and they were later sealed in the Logan Temple. Bonnie preceded him in death on July 27, 2023.

Curtis remained a lifelong resident of East Garland and Tremonton. He was a farmer and rancher and as a dedicated high school graduate, he pursued his passion as a PADI Certified Dive Master.
