Hal Wayne Worthen, 80, passed away on the evening of Monday, March 24, 2025, at the Wyoming Medical Center in Casper, Wyoming, of pneumonia and complications of a stroke. Wayne passed peacefully, among his family and friends. Wayne was born Feb. 15, 1945, in Price, Utah, the beloved son of Hal and Beula Worthen, and grew up surrounded by his siblings, Lynda, Shannon, Jennifer, Bonna, and Tom. A natural entrepreneur, he started a small transportation business that, through his vision and dedication, grew into a thriving transport and tour company. His ability to connect with people and his relentless work ethic turned his business into more than just a livelihood — it became a way for him to share his love of travel and experiences with others. He cared deeply for his employees and became lifelong friends with many of them. He will be remembered for his generous spirit, his love of storytelling, and his unwavering loyalty to those he held dear.
