



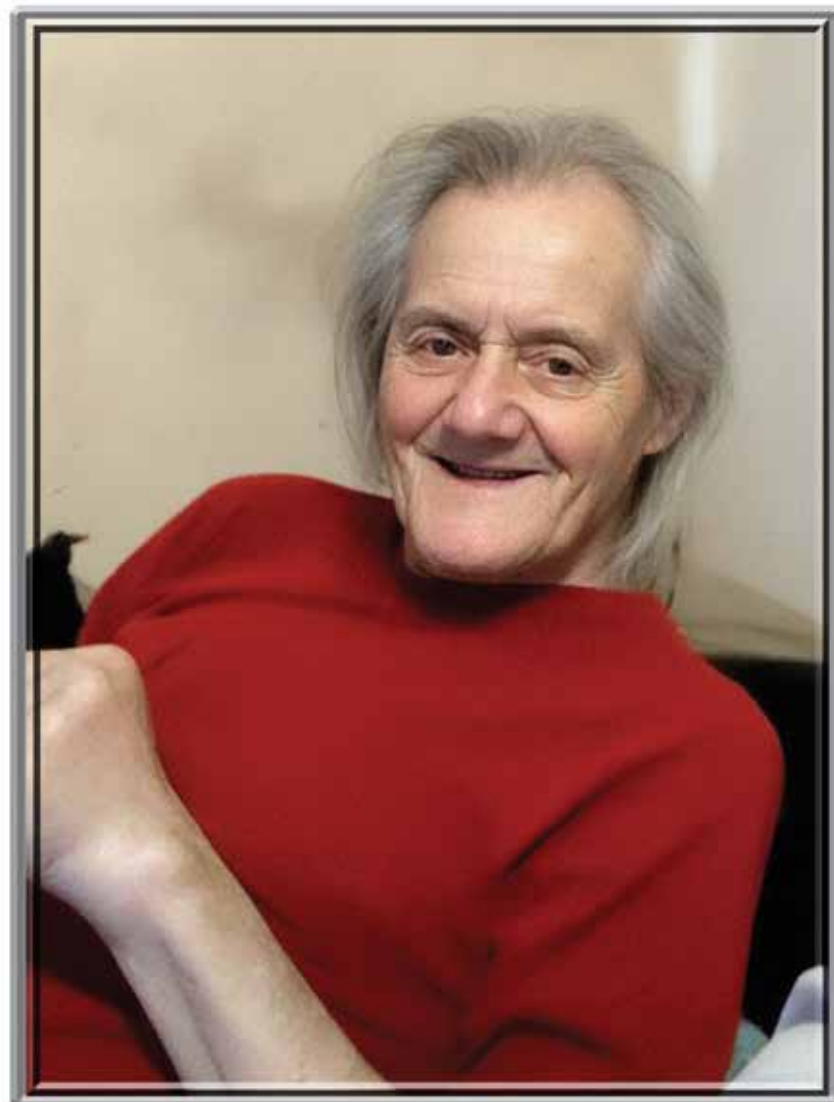

March 15, 1953 – July 3, 2026

Lloyd Franklin Vit Sr., 73, passed away on July 3, 2026, in Logan, Utah. He was born on March 15, 1953, in Ogden, Utah, to Joe and Pearl Dolores Lee Vit. Lloyd graduated from Ben Lomond High School. He married Marian “Chris” Christian on August 13, 1969. They were married for approximately 25 years before later divorcing. Lloyd’s family owned and operated a fruit orchard and nursery. This was the family business for Lloyd growing up. As a young father Lloyd worked for FMC Jetway as a welder.

Highly intelligent and entirely self-taught, Lloyd was an exceptional mechanic who could figure out how to fix or build anything. He was adventurous, always willing to try new things, and became both a licensed pilot and a certified scuba diver alongside a close family member. He was also an avid hunter and fisherman, Lloyd’s sharp mind led him to own and operate multiple businesses over his life, including Vit Construction (with his brother George), Faber Weld / Faber Tech, Morgan Valley Metals, GDL Fabrication, and Intermountain Aviation. To those who knew him well, he was a best friend and a consistently calming presence.

With his passing comes the end of an era. He was the last of Pearl and Joe’s children, and now that entire generation has gone home. It’s a bittersweet reminder of how quickly time passes and how precious the memories they leave behind truly are. His favorite car was a model A, building it from the ground up.

Lloyd lived life on his own terms. He was adventurous, bold, wild, and wonderfully free. He wasn’t afraid to speak his mind, chase a new adventure, or take on a challenge that others would walk away from. He had a sharp mind, a quick wit, and an even sharper tongue. He could make you laugh until your sides hurt, and if something needed to be said, you could count on him to say it.

Like all of us, he wasn’t perfect. He was quick to laugh, quick to temper, but also just as quick to help the people he loved. If you were family or a friend, you knew he would stand beside you when it mattered. His loyalty ran deep, even if he didn’t always show it in conventional ways.

He loved airplanes and flying them. Lloyd loved figuring out how things worked, and if something was broken, there was a good chance he could fix it. He found joy in building, repairing, and solving problems. And perhaps more than anything, he loved his dogs. Anyone who knew Lloyd knew they held a special place in his heart, maybe even a little higher than most people.

He lived a life that was uniquely his, leaving behind stories that will be told for years to come, laughter that still echoes in our memories, and a legacy of living boldly and authentically.

Rest easy, Uncle Lloyd. Thank you for the laughs, the stories, the lessons, and for being exactly who you were. You will be deeply missed by so many but never forgotten.
