LIFE'S REFLECTIONS



On November 30, 2023, Francis (Frank) Mario Quinn lost his short battle with the rare cancer, Acute Myelogenous Leukemia, at the age of 68. Born on March 30, 1955, Frank was seventh of ten children born to John (Jack) Quinn and Nancy Fenn Quinn. He was preceded in death by his sister Anne Quinn McNamara (2020), his brother Joseph Quinn (2021), and his parents Jack (1989) and Nancy (2008). He is survived by his wife Laura Eileen Quinn; his sons: Steven Lee Quinn (Kayla) and Daniel Isaiah Quinn; and his daughter Meghan Eileen Quinn.

Frank is also survived by his brother John (Katharine); his sister Cynthia; his sister Mary; his sister Helaine; his brother Brian (Janet); his sister Elizabeth; his brother Matthew (Julie); and many nieces, nephews and cousins.

After graduating from Westhill High School in Stamford, CT in 1973, Frank went to work for "The Landmark" in New York City managing apartment complexes. Later he took his skills from that experience and began construction work. With a talent for coordinating contractors, he worked first as a foreman and next as a superintendent, then progressing through many successful projects he began working for world-class consulting firm Heery International. Later through a merger he worked for Heery/ CBRE and, recently after an acquisition, at Turner and Townsend, NYC.

He served as a consultant for the construction of the FBI regional headquarters in Louisville, KY., the construction of the BOP Federal Correctional Complex High Security Prison in Yazoo City, MS., and the renovation and expansion of the Charles R. Jonas Federal Building and Courthouse in Charlotte, N.C. His final project was at the first-of-its-kind U.S. Postal RPDC in Fairburn, GA.

Wherever he went, anyone who got to know him had an opportunity to hear about God's Kingdom. Frank was not shy about his faith and would explain his beliefs to anyone who listened. He especially loved the book of Daniel and its many prophecies about our time. Also, Matthew 24 and the signs of the last days. He wanted people to know what the Bible said and would often quote scripture. What he said about his remaining time was that all he wanted to do was to teach people, especially his family, about the Kingdom of God.

He fought hard to stay with us as long as he could and from October 19th, when he was diagnosed, he made the most out of every second, seeking the best possible medical treatment and spending time with his wife and children. He passed away quietly at home with them by his side.
