She never shared her pain.

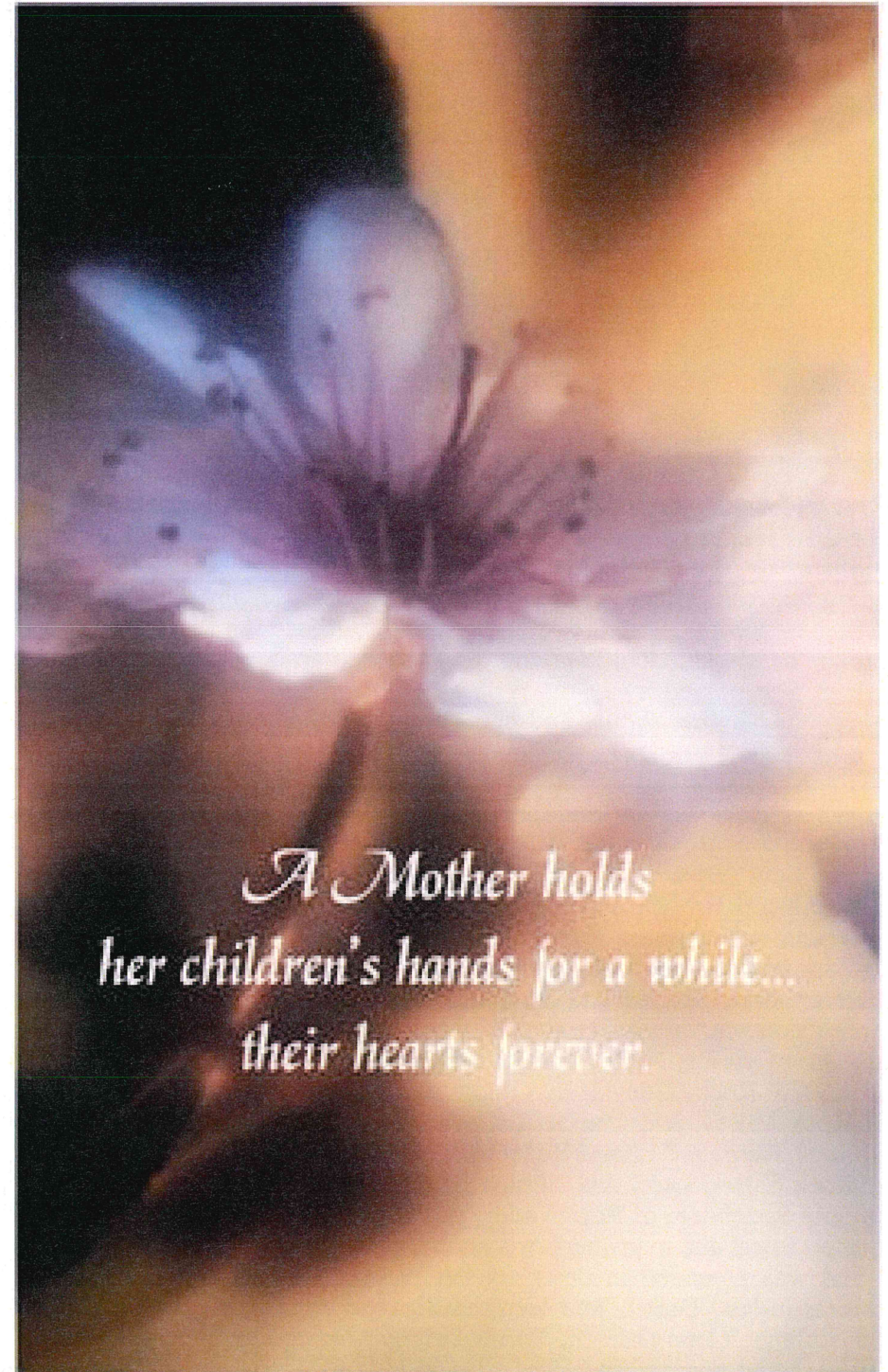
In her quiet strength she carried on,
