LIFE REFLECTIONS

“A precious one from us is gone. A voice we loved is still, a place is vacant in our home that never can be filled.”

Mrs. Terri Laberia Kind, beloved daughter of Terry Larry and Barbara Ann Williams Furman, was born on December 2, 1979, in Sumter County, South Carolina. She peacefully departed this earthly life on Friday, April 17, 2026, at her home in Wahiawa, Hawaii. Terri was a proud graduate of Lakewood High School, Class of 1999, where her bright spirit and caring nature were evident.

Terri’s love story began in the most unexpected way—accompanying a friend to a Christmas party, where she received the greatest gift of all: the love of her life, Joseph Kind. Their union, sealed in marriage on April 23, 2005, was one built on unwavering love, faith, and devotion. Joe describes Terri as the very heart and anchor of their family—selfless, compassionate, and full of grace who held the family together. She always took care of other people’s needs before her needs. She had a calming presence and a wisdom that brought peace to those around her. She was the person who Joe knew once he shared his “rough” day, Terri comforting words would make the day bright again. In moments of difficulty, her words were a source of light and comfort. Terri lived out the truth of *Proverbs 31:26*: “She opens her mouth with wisdom, and the teaching of kindness is on her tongue,” embodying a spirit that uplifted everyone she encountered.

As a mother, Terri’s love knew no bounds. Terri was a deeply devoted mother to TaReanna (Pinky) and Jova, pouring into them encouragement, discipline, and unconditional support. From the time her children were a young age, she instilled in them the importance of education and the pursuit of excellence, always envisioning them as college graduates and future leaders. Terri’s support for her children did not cease when they became 18 years old; she prayed for her children and reached out to others to cover her children in prayer. When Pinky went off to Howard University in Washington, Terri reached out to her aunt, uncles, and cousins to make sure Pinky had a community of loved ones to support her. Recently, she reached out to an uncle to help Jova pack up his college dorm for the upcoming summer break. Terri’s actions reflected her enduring faith. Above all, she was a proud “daddy’s girl,” holding a special bond with her father that was rooted in love and devotion.

Terri was not perfect; she had a wee little problem. Terri loved to shop and shop and shop—especially for purses. She took delight in finding that perfect piece, no matter the cost.
