Candace Karen Robertson was born on February 20, 1949, to the late Martha and LeRoy Johnson in Eddy County, North Dakota. Candace, affectionately known as "Candy", attended elementary through high school in New Rockford, ND.

Candy met Lowell Rosenberg while she worked at a New Rockford diner, and the two moved to Mississippi and married in the early 1970s. Their marriage produced three daughters: Dawn, Jill, and Tara. Years later, Candy and Lyman "Joe" Robertson met and married, and Joe's son, Timothy, became one of Candy's babies.

Candy believed in working hard, always doing her best, and trusting God to take care of the rest. She furthered her education by attending Holmes Community College in Ridgeland, MS, where she earned her Associates Degree in Accounting in 1997. After graduating, she worked for many years in the office at Yazoo Planters Gin in Yazoo County before retiring in 2015.

She lived a full life which included becoming the first woman in Yazoo County to receive her pilot's license in the late 1970s, earning a red belt in Taekwondo alongside Timothy, graduating with honors from Holmes CC, and working multiple jobs to provide for her children. She loved God and regularly reminded herself and her loved ones to trust Him. She attended Methodist churches her entire life as long as her health allowed, most recently worshiping at First Independent Methodist Church in Yazoo City where she met many of her good friends in Christ.

Candy was preceded in death by her parents, one sibling (John), a brother-in-law (Hjalmer Anderson), and her good friend of many years, Leslie Smith. Candy loved WWE, sitcoms, and tough-guy movies, which she enjoyed alongside her loved ones, especially her grandchildren. For many years, Candy and Leslie watched WWE Raw and Smackdown two nights a week.
